

#### GREEN AND GOLD TOUR STOPS IN MONETT AND NEVADA

The events have been well received in these communities, and also garnered significant media coverage. The next stop on the Green and Gold Tour is Seneca, scheduled for Jan. 6.







# INAUGURAL MOSO CONNECT | FOOD FOR THOUGHT



The President's Office is hosting a new series of events for all faculty and staff—branded MOSO Connect. The goals of MOSO Connect are to strengthen campus community, and to enable our employees to learn more about some great aspects of Missouri Southern.

Each MOSO Connect event includes a complimentary luncheon and a brief program. The first event, attended by over 60 faculty, staff and administrators, focused on international education. Speakers included Chad Stebbins, Institute of International Studies Director; Aaron Carmichael, Intensive English Program Director; Stacey Clay, Coordinator of International Admissions and Student Services; a

student from Joplin who studied abroad in Austria, Thailand and Morocco; a student from St. Joseph who studied abroad in France; and international students from South Africa, Mexico and South Korea.

The next MOSO Connect event is scheduled for Dec. 3 and will focus on music. Dr. David Sharlow, the Missouri Southern Chamber Singers and Concert Chorale will showcase several songs from their upcoming A Seasonal Choral Flourish, pairing classical standards with both sacred and pop-oriented carols.

#### MEETING WITH LEGISLATIVE DELEGATION

We continue to appreciate the support of our local legislative delegation, including for the additional core funding and the one-time funds for Taylor Performing Arts Center (TPAC) that Missouri Southern received in the 2021 state budget. In the next month, campus leadership will be meeting with our delegation to discuss the upcoming legislative session, including specific requests for support of the university.



### ACACIA CENTER RIBBON-CUTTING HELD OCT. 21, 2021



The ACACIA Center for Applied Behavior Analysis, located in the Gene Taylor Education building, hosted its official ribbon-cutting on Oct. 21 under the direction of Drs. Holly Hackett and Ayla Schmick. The center will provide behavioral, educational and social services to families of children with autism spectrum disorder. Applied Behavior Analysis uses the principles of learning to improve social and academic behaviors of children and adults and is one of the most well-established treatment approaches for individuals with autism. The center was funded with gifts from

Freeman Health System and Ozark Center and grants through MoExcels and the Missouri Department of Social Services. Former Senator Gary Nodlerspoke to the MoExcels funding avenue and the community need for this type of educational service.

#### MISSOURI SOUTHERN STATE UNIVERSITY MASS BAND DAY



The Music Department's Lion Pride Marching Band hosted this event on Oct. 30 culminating in the football game's halftime performance. This year the show was Halloween-themed and included music from All American Nightmare and Thriller. Over 300 high-school band students attended from Frontenac, Diamond, Seneca and Webb City. From the four schools, three of the band teachers were alumni. Six instrumental faculty assisted with sectionals and 14 student leaders assisted with sectional rehearsals and logistics. Dr. Brandon Robinson, visiting assistant professor of band, and Michael Olgesby, assistant band director, led the event.

# DENTAL HYGIENE TELEDENTISTRY ACTIVITIES CONTINUE





The Dental Hygiene Department at Missouri Southern is the sole recipient of a grant opportunity provided by the Department of Health and Senior Services designed to improve oral hygiene for seniors in nursing home care. Currently our students provide services to approximately 50 residents at the Communities of Wildwood in Joplin. The grant also provides the opportunity to provide a preventative service program and an application of fluoride

varnish for elementary schools in Jasper, Avilla and Sarcoxie. More than 250 children have been screened with an additional 300 students scheduled in early December. Other related departmental activities in October, National Dental Hygiene month, included participation in the Lion Cub Academy Trunk or Treat, giving out more than 100 toothbrushes and coloring books and the "Chang-ing Smiles Campaign," which raised \$875 in spare change across campus. Dr. Van Galen's office was top fund raiser.

#### **MIDWESTERN ESPORTS ARENA**



The new Midwestern Esports Arena is a multi-station gaming center with gaming PC and console options including the new PS5, Xbox Series X, Nintendo Switch, earlier generation PlayStation and Xbox consoles, as well as optional "hookup" ports for gamers to bring their own equipment. It is strategically located on the first floor of Billingsly Student Center inside the Beimdiek Recreation Center. Steven Benfield, director of Recreational Services, envisions using the space for things such as Esport tournaments, hosting

computer coding classes/workshops, and providing student internship opportunities at both MSSU and Midwestern Interactive, a local software and design company that sponsored the project.

There are 34 students registered for the Esports club. The club has two tracks: recreational play and competitive play. Seth Sockwell is the advisor for the recreational track, which focuses more on console gaming and leisurely play. Nick Reynolds is the advisor for the competitive track. This group has set up a MOSO Esports Discord for club/member communication and they are currently researching tournament platforms and planning for internal/local tournaments.

#### HEERF III/AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN - STUDENT PORTION

The Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund III (HEERF III) is authorized by the American Rescue Plan (ARP), providing \$39.6 billion in support to institutions of higher education to serve students and ensure learning continues during the COVID-19 pandemic. In August 2021, MSSU was approved for \$7,636,833 in financial grants to students, which may be used for any component of the student's cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care), or child care. The fall portion of the HEERF III grants were distributed to students on Oct. 24. A total of \$4,012,400 was disbursed to 4,344 eligible students for the fall semester. Out of the total disbursed, \$143,000 was applied directly to student account balances at MSSU. There will be another distribution of these funds for the Spring 2022 semester.

#### STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

Several departments within Student Affairs continue to offer a variety of co-curricular experiences designed to promote student engagement.

#### STUDENT SUCCESS

Financial Aid hosted the annual FAFSA Fiesta event to help current students complete the federal financial aid application. Project Stay presented two workshops in October including "How to Get Started Investing" and "American Sign Language Basics." In addition to coordinating the annual Major/Minor Fair, ACTS/FYE offered a variety of activities during the Connect 2 U Mental Health Awareness Week. Global Leaders hosted three quest speakers for the campus community including: alumna Whitney Mastelle, Diversity Equity & Inclusion; Vice Admiral Jeffrey Trussler, Global Leadership; and Shawn Askinozie, Global Leadership. Career Services offered many career preparatory events including Rapid Résumé Reviews, Networking 101, Suit Up with JCPenney, Internship Expo and two virtual professional development workshops focused on résumés and interview essentials. A.L.I.C.E. and Green Dot training was provided by the **UPD** and Green Dot programs as part of the UE 100 curriculum.

#### JAPAN SEMESTER



Fresh Ideas sponsored a Taste of Japan event featuring four action stations in the Mayes Dining Hall on Tuesday, Sept. 14. In addition to the regularly-scheduled Grocery Bingo, trivia, and movies, Student Activities/Campus Activity Board has hosted three Japan-themed activities for students this fall including a virtual beginning origami class, make-and-take bonsai tree kits, and make-and-take miniature Zen gardens.

#### HOMECOMING



Homecoming Week was filled with activities including a "Lions Through the Decades"-themed spirit week, door decoration contest, office decoration contest, photo booth, trivia, bingo, and T-shirt giveaways. The **Student Activities/Campus Activity Board** also hosted the annual Homecoming picnic on the Oval, which included the King and Queen coronation ceremony. Many **Registered Student Organizations** created original floats for the parade, which was held in downtown Joplin this year.


#### **HALLOWEEN**





#### CONSTRUCTION







#### Pedestrian safety in the main parking lot – Raised walking medians

• Curb and guttering are nearly complete around the medians and the stamped concrete crosswalks are in the process of being poured and sealed. The parking lot (with exception of landscaping) should be complete the week of November 15.

# Street replacement/crosswalks - International Avenue from Newman Rd. to University Parkway

• Work is scheduled to begin next week and extend into the first week of December.

### Tunnel safety improvements - Interior enhancements and new lighting

• The tunnel is closed through the end of the semester. Work on each end of the tunnel has started as well as the interior upgrades.

# Oval infrastructure – New sidewalks, lighting, landscaping, and entrances to Hearnes, Spiva Library, Reynold's Hall and Webster Hall

- New pavers have been installed in front of Webster and landscaping has begun.
- Revamping the entrance to Hearnes Hall from the east is complete; landscaping has started and should be complete next week.
- The entrance to Hearnes Hall from the west (off of the Oval) has not started yet, pending fountain (donor-funded) design.
- The fountain (donor-funded) in front of Spiva Library is being designed and the concrete work in front of the facility off of the Oval is on hold pending that design.
- New pavers and a seat wall have been installed in front of Reynolds Hall. Seat wall cap will be installed mid-December.
- The replacement of an old water line will be complete in December due to delays in material.
- Installation of new light poles on the Oval will occur in December.
- Sidewalk replacement and tree removal on the Oval continues and should be complete by the end of December.

The project should be complete around the first of February, depending on the weather and fountain designs.

## **Taylor Performing Arts Center (TPAC)**

• The contractor bids came in with R.E. Smith being awarded the contract. We will be replacing the seats and carpet as well as remediating the interior wall problem which caused the closure of the facility for the past two years. MSSU will be receiving \$2.5M in state capital appropriations, which should be sufficient to fund the needed improvements. TPAC should be reopened approximately one year from now.

#### NCAA GOVERNANCE UPDATE

On July 30, the NCAA Board of Governors announced the decision to convene a special constitutional convention in November and the formation of a 28-person Constitution Committee. The committee is chaired by Dr. Robert M. Gates, an independent member of the Board of Governors, former U.S. Secretary of Defense, and former president at Texas A&M University. The committee consists of two independent Board of Governors, 16 Division I representatives, 5 Division II representatives, and 5 Division III representatives. Division II representatives are:

- Gayle Hutchinson President, Chico State
- Jim Johnson Director of Athletics, Pittsburg State
- Madeleine McKenna Volleyball Student-Athlete, California University of Pennsylvania
- Julie Ruppert Commissioner, Northeast-10 Conference
- Harry Stinson Director of Athletics, Lincoln University of Pennsylvania

The central charge of this committee is to reassess the basic mission and role of the NCAA while tackling the question – how can the association serve student-athletes and its member institutions? The committee is seeking simplification and clarity in developing a new NCAA Constitution, while working to determine what aspects of intercollegiate athletics should be governed at the association, division, conference, and institutional levels. Division-specific operating bylaws are not part of this initial review.

In late August a survey of student-athletes as well as campus, conference, and coaches' association leaders was conducted. Nearly 5,000 individual responses were recorded, including 81% of all Division II athletic directors. Survey results indicated over three-quarters of all respondents agreed the following principles were central to the future of the NCAA as a governing body: conducting national championships, the primacy of academic experience in policy and decision making, sport-specific rules for competition and participation, standards for allocation of national revenue, standards for athlete eligibility, and standards for athlete health and safety. Generally speaking, the membership in Division II and Division III are much more satisfied with the current governance structure than those in Division I.

On November 8, initial concepts of a new NCAA constitution were presented to the membership. The specially-called constitutional convention will take place on Nov. 15. After a month of

feedback and review, final recommendations will be presented to the Board of Governors on Dec. 15. Membership-sponsored amendments will be considered until an association-wide vote takes place on Jan. 20 at the NCAA Convention in Indianapolis, Ind.

Following the adoption of a new constitution, each divisional governance structure will be charged with reviewing and rewriting the rules governing the division to ensure they are consistent with the new constitution. This process will take place between January and August of 2022 to be effective for the 2022-23 academic year.

### ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME WEEKEND










After a one-year hiatus, the Missouri Southern athletic department resumed its annual Hall of Fame celebration on Oct. 29-30. The Hall of Fame Class of 2021 was comprised of Steve Forbis '86 (football), Chuck Pittman '93 (baseball), Kimi (Shank) Reed '10 (Cross Country/Track & Field), Jamie Burhnam (Cross Country/Track & Field – Coach), and the 1986 and 1990 softball teams. The weekend began with a Friday evening reception in the North End Zone Facility for inductees and their guests. Saturday morning more than 170 people enjoyed brunch and the official induction ceremony in Young Gymnasium. Inductees were invited to the president's gameday celebration and honored at halftime of the football game.

Of note, 14 of 15 members of the 1986 softball team and 15 of 17 members of the 1990 team were able to attend, including one alumna that traveled all the way from Seattle, Wash.. The current softball team was in attendance for the induction ceremony and on Saturday evening competed against a team of alumnae, led by Hall of Fame coach Dr. Pat Lipira.

#### TRICK OR TREAT SO OTHERS CAN EAT

The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) once again lead an effort by MSSU studentathletes to collect canned goods and nonperishable items for the benefit of Soul's Harbor, a human services and homeless shelter in downtown Joplin.



Student-athletes began by distributing flyers in neighborhoods throughout Joplin and surrounding communities. These flyers asked people to consider gathering items for donation and placing them on their front porch. Student-athletes then returned to collect the donated goods. The effort culminated on November 1 when SAAC representatives, along with advisor Cori Reid, delivered 6,302 items to Soul's Harbor. The donation annually serves as the shelter's single largest and provides enough to keep their shelves stocked through the winter months.

This serves as a tremendous example that our student-athletes can have within our community and is something we want to continue to build upon as community engagement becomes an area of increased focus for the Athletic Department.

#### LIONBACKER UPDATE

After a down year in 2020-21 due to COVID-19 (canceled football season and limited basketball spectators), Lionbacker donations have rebounded to near pre-pandemic levels. The 2021 membership drive has garnered 226 members and \$113,500 in total donations to date. This is a significant improvement over the 2020-21 totals of 139 donors and \$75,840, and is approaching the 2019-20 level of 286 memberships and \$122,900.

The average gift made through Lionbackers this year is \$502.21, up from \$429.72 during the 2019-20 campaign. Additionally, there have been 41 donors join at the \$1,200 level or higher, up from a previous high of 35.

With the membership push for basketball season still ongoing, it is likely that we will exceed the 2019-20 total dollars raised while likely falling a bit short of the total membership level. The funds raised through Lionbacker memberships will once again be distributed to our sport programs and other areas of athletics to help meet previously identified priority needs.
