Report by Justin Maskus Athletics to Board of Governors Wednesday, April 25th, 2018

MSSU Athletics Report

1. Sport Program Reports

- a. Men's Basketball The Missouri Southern men's basketball team finished the season 20-10 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. CJ Carr was an All-MIAA, All-Region and All-American selection, while also being named to the All-Defensive Team. Elyjah Clark was a second-team All-MIAA pick, while Kinzer Lambert was an Honorable Mention pick. Head Coach Jeff Boschee was named the MIAA Coach of the Year, helping the Lions to the No. 2 seed in the MIAA Tournament after being picked to finish sixth in the preseason poll.
- b. <u>Women's Basketball</u> The Missouri Southern women's basketball team finished 11-17 this season. Juniors Desirea Buerge and Chelsey Henry were named All-MIAA with Buerge earning second-team honors and Henry being named honorable mention. Buerge finished second in the MIAA in scoring, while Henry was fifth. Buerge was second in the league in rebounding.
- c. <u>Track and Field</u> The Missouri Southern men's and women's track and field teams will host the Bill Williams/Bob Laptad Invitational on Friday this week. The field events will start at 11 am with running events beginning at 1 pm. The women are ranked 18th nationally, while both teams are ranked sixth in the region. Bryan Burns and Emily Presley were both named the MIAA Men's and Women's Field Athletes of the Week, respectively, this week. The Southern men have seven NCAA provisional marks this season, led by Burns who is ranked second in the discus, seventh in the shot put and 15th in the hammer throw. The women have five NCAA provisional marks, led by Emily Presley, the reigning NCAA Division II Champion in the indoor and outdoor pole vault who leads Division II this year by four inches in the event. Allie Heckemeyer currently has the third-best mark in the heptathlon.
- d. <u>Golf –</u> The Missouri Southern men's golf team has opened up the 2018 MIAA Tournament this week at Sycamore Ridge Golf Course in Spring Hill, Kan. The Lions were first after day one of the tournament and are currently ninth after day two. The final day of the tournament will be today.
- e. <u>Baseball –</u> The Missouri Southern baseball team is 23-20 on the season and played at Pittsburg State yesterday. The Lions will be at Central Missouri this weekend. Junior Denver Coffey tied a single-game MSSU record with five runs scored against Southwest Baptist on April 13. The Lions lead the MIAA in ERA this season, while the team ranks 15th nationally in walks (offensive). Alex Phillips is 15th nationally in walks, while Cory Canterbury ranks ninth in doubles.
- f. <u>Softball</u> The Missouri Southern softball team finished the season 23-29 overall and 10-16 in the MIAA, just missing out on the MIAA post season tournament. The Lions were led by Abi Corbett as the senior led the MIAA in hits for the second-straight year and ranked fourth nationally. Corbett also became the MSSU all-time leader in hits (270) and stolen bases with 107. Her 35 stolen bases this year are tied for the second-most in a single-season at MSSU.
- g. Other News The Missouri Southern athletic department had six current or former student-athletes earn the Glen Dolence Award for Leadership this year. Jenson Maydew (Basketball/Track and Field), Zach Wuest (Track and Field), Katie Wiele (Former Volleyball), Sierra Wells (Track and Field), Cora Butcher-Spellman (Track and Field), and Allie Heckemeyer (Track and Field) all earned the honor.
- h. <u>Boston Marathon</u> Former Missouri Southern All-American Kimi (Shank) Reed was part of a stellar group of American runners at this year's Boston Marathon. Reed finished eight amongst the women and was part of seven women from the USA in the top ten of the race.

Fundraising

- Major Gifts Received Since the last Board of Governors meeting, the following major gifts (\$10,000+) have been received:
 - \$100,000 for an endowed scholarship for students from Miller and Lamar High Schools;
 - \$84,000 to establish an endowed scholarship in nursing;
 - \$10,000 for a dental hygiene scholarship;
 - \$10,000 for a variety of university programs.
- <u>Database Update</u> In an effort to **continually update constituent data** in the Raisers Edge system, over 3,400 new places of employment were identified in the last month. Of those, 48 are companies who match private gifts.
- <u>3D Printer Donation</u> Faculty in the departments of Engineering Technology and Art were the recipients of three 3D printers from NemoTech of Joplin. Mike Parrot, founder of the firm and formerly of EaglePicher (pictured right), made the presentation to the campus on April 12.



Admissions

Sophomore Day – Over 1,200 tenth grade students and teachers from local high schools descended on MSSU on April 3, for the annual Sophomore Day. The success of this event is evidenced by the fact that the State of Missouri stopped paying for a state-wide testing day this year, which originally necessitated this event. The schools who participated in 2018 did so



because they saw the value in exposing their students to collegiate academic programs. Many thanks to the faculty and staff who facilitated the 27 simultaneous presentations.

- Crowder Enrollment Event Staff from the Office of Admissions held an enrollment event on the campus of Crowder College on April 12. Over 70 potential students participated in this "one-stop" event designed to make transferring to Missouri Southern as easy as possible. MSSU offices such as Financial Aid, ACTS, IT, Registrar, and a number of faculty made this event very successful.
- Tassel Toppers The Office of Admissions mailed over 1,800 tassel toppers to all freshmen admitted to MSSU for the fall 2018 semester. Playing off of the tradition of decorating your mortar board for graduation, these toppers proudly announce, "I'm a future Lion." 

Report of the Faculty Liaison to the Board of Governors

The Faculty Senate met on Monday, April 3, 2018 at 3:00 PM. The following is a summary of that meeting

Old Business

There was no old business at this meeting.

New Business - Handbook Oriented Items

The first item Faculty Senate discussed was the initiation of a Handbook Mandated full-time faculty salary review. The Faculty Handbook, in Chapter 7, Section IV, Subsection A (p. 55), states that:

"At least every three years, beginning in 2015, overall salary levels for full-time faculty members will be reviewed based on section VII below. Equity adjustments will be recommended to the administration as necessary to assure reasonable competitiveness for all disciplines. These periodic adjustments will be subject to the budget constraints of the University."

The last review was completed during the 2015 Academic Year and new review should be triggered after 3 years. Based on the Handbook, the Faculty Senate has requested such a review. According to Section VII (p.55-56), it is incumbent upon the Office of Academic Affairs, in conjunction with Faculty Welfare and Faculty Senate, to conduct the review. FSEC has asked that the office of Academic Affairs provide Faculty Welfare and FSEC with the faculty salary data, including any/all collected demographic information. Faculty Senate fully expects that this process will take some time and spillover into the 2018-2019 Academic Year.

We also reviewed four Faculty Handbook revisions and all revisions were approved by the Senate at the April 2nd meeting. The following changes were approved: (1) A reduction in the office hours policy from 10 to 6, with the possibility for digital office hours; (2) Language that formally combines the Tenure and Promotion Committees into a single entity; (3) Language that corrects and clarifies the faculty grievance policy for staff who also act as faculty; and (4) Language for the addition of a new Faculty Senate Committee entitled, the Faculty Information Technology Advisory Committee. On item 4, there were two successful amendments to the language. The first amendment added a representative from the Library to the committee. The second amendment added a representative from the Staff Senate to the committee. Both of these amendments were unanimously approved.

A few notes on the IT Advisory Committee language. First, this language was reviewed and approved by the Handbook committee after its approval by the Senate. The Handbook committee was unable to meet in time to review the recommendations from the Committee on Committees, so this item was reviewed out of order. The Faculty Senate had to review the language at its meeting first, because this language required the positive approval of all-faculty with a two-thirds majority vote. A vote was required because this committee will be added to the Senate bylaws in Chapter 2 of the Handbook, which requires an all-faculty vote. This vote took place at the all-faculty end-of-year meeting on April 24, 2018 at 4:00 PM. The faculty voted and overwhelmingly approved of the initiative (over 84% voted yes) to add the IT Committee to the Chapter 2 of the Faculty Handbook bylaws.

New Business - CORE 42

The Senate was also asked to review items pertaining to MSSU's core. First, we discussed having the International Mission and Lifetime Wellness take up the remaining five credits for MSSU's core. Second, we discussed splitting up

humanities and fine arts in the Core, requiring students to complete 3 credit hours specifically from a selection of art courses, rather than lumping arts in with humanities. Finally, we discussed the Core 42 documents writ large and had a very productive discussion. The Senate overwhelming and enthusiastically supported all of the MSSU-specific CORE 42 adaptations.

Board Report 04-25-18

<u>Budget</u> – As you recall, the House (HB3) would restore \$68 million to the higher education budget if colleges and universities agreed to raise tuition no more than 1% next year. You will also recall that we were carved out of that deal due to our extraordinarily low funding per FTE (state appropriations plus tuition).

When the Senate took up the budget bill they decided to restore \$68 million without the 1% tuition constraint... so the other institutions in the state could then raise tuition 2.1% as authorized by SB 389. The precarious financial position we found ourselves in here at Missouri Southern also caused Senate Appropriations Chair, Dan Brown, to add \$2 million in one-time funding for us.

The budget will now head to conference where the final version will be hammered out. We certainly hope the \$2 million remains in the budget and survives the Governor's review and ultimately obtains his signature.

With our new tuition structure and this assistance from the state we can erase the growing annual budget deficits we were facing... this year the budget deficit was \$800,000 and absent the changes we are making on both the revenue and expense side that number would have kept growing.

And, if colleges and universities decide not to agree with the tuition freeze the restoration would shrink to \$38 million and \$30 million would be added to the Access Missouri scholarship fund. These scholarship funds would be great if they were coming from new money, but as it is the funds are in effect being taken from our core budgets.

<u>Higher Learning Commission (HLC)</u> – With the passing of my mother-in-law I was unable to attend the annual HLC conference this year, but we were well represented and the attendees came back with important insights. One item deals specifically with the Board of Governors and the periodic review and updating of bylaws. HLC now expects the board to conduct a thorough review every 3 to 5 years. So, we will need to schedule some planning time in the fall to review the bylaws.

<u>Great Game of Education (GGOE)</u> – I want to again highlight the great work the GGOE team are doing, and confirm that we have been invited to make a presentation at the CACUBO annual meeting in Chicago later this year (Central Association of College and University Business Officers). We are still finalizing our arrangement with SRC Holdings, parent of the Great Game of Business, and hope to have all the details worked out well in advance of the CACUBO presentation this September.

Mother-in-law – In closing, I would like to thank the Board of Governors and the Missouri Southern family for the beautiful flowers, expressions of sympathy, and warm cards of encouragement at the passing of my mother-in-law, Gloria Zimmerman. She was a wonderful person and she will be missed terribly. So, on behalf of our entire family I would like to thank each of you personally and collectively for your thoughtful and kind gestures of support. We are very grateful.

Certificates, Minors, Degree Programs

The following items have been approved/accepted by the respective School Curriculum Oversight Committees (SCOC), Academic Policies (AP) and Faculty Senate (FS) as of <u>April 2, 2018</u>.

Certificates - New

Theatre Stage Technology – Theatre Department: This certificate will provide a path for students to focus on technical theatre in both the classroom and practical settings by providing formal training through classroom and laboratory instruction.

Theatrical Design – Theatre Department: Provides a path for students to focus on theatrical design in both classroom and practical settings. Employers in the design field want to see both formal training and course credits.

Costume Technology - Provides a path for students to focus on costume technology in both classroom and practical settings. Employers in the design field want to see both formal training and course credits.

Advanced Practice Para-medicine – Emergency Medical Services Department: As the demand for skilled flight paramedics, critical care ground paramedics and community paramedics increases, MSSU has the opportunity to be the leader in providing this advanced level of education.

Majors and Minors

Chemistry and Biochemistry Degrees – Biochemistry degrees will be moved under the chemistry degree and offered as a specific subfield (Biochemistry, Pre-medical, Pre-pharmacy, Pre-veterinarian, Pre-dental, Pre-optometry, Forensic Science).

International and Political Affairs BA and BS Degrees – These degree programs are the result of a collaboration between several areas in the Social Sciences department and the International Studies department and replaces low completer degree programs in Political Science, Geography and International Studies. This versatile new programs include 5 Bachelor of Art options and 4 Bachelor of Science options. This is a unique opportunity to prepare students for careers and graduate study in law, public administration, public policy, political science, geography and international service.

Other

Title IX Statement on Syllabus Template – It is a federal requirement that we provide Title IX information to all employees and students using a variety of methods. Adding this information to the syllabus template ensures every faculty member and student sees the information and provides an additional educational opportunity for faculty and students. The proposed statement also includes our non-discrimination statement.

Missouri Southern State University emphasizes the dignity and equality common to all persons and adheres to a strict nondiscrimination policy regarding the treatment of individual faculty, staff, students, third parties on campus, and applicants for employment and admissions.
