Report by Jared Bruggeman Athletics to Board of Governors Thursday, September 20, 2018

MSSU Athletics Report

1. Sport Program Reports

- a. <u>Football –</u> The football Lions currently lead the MIAA in fourth down conversion defense, as well as blocked punts and kicks, while ranking third in fewest penalty yards per game. Individually, Alex Alvarado and Trevor Plafcan rank 18th nationally in fumble recoveries, while Shemar Coleman ranks 34th in kickoff returns. Head Coach Denver Johnson recently stepped down and Defensive Coordinator Joe Bettasso will serve as the interim head coach for the remainder of the season.
- b. <u>Soccer</u>—The MSSU soccer team is 4-1-1 on the season after a 2-1 win at Southwest Baptist last Sunday. The Lions will host Central Oklahoma on Friday at 6 pm and Northeastern State on Sunday at 1 pm. A trio of Lions lead the team with two goals and four points each as freshman Bailey Belcher, Senior Alex McCord and sophomore Sarah Tatum lead the offensive charge for the Green and Gold. Sophomore Meredith Belrose has a team-high two assists.
- c. <u>Cross Country</u>—The MSSU men's and women's cross country programs recently hosted the 29th-annual Missouri Southern Stampede at the Tom Rutledge Cross Country Course. One of the largest meets in the US annually, the Lions saw nearly 3,000 runners in the ten races the course hosted last Saturday. The Southern men finished second overall behind only the University of Tulsa and freshman Gidieon Kimutai was second individually, just two seconds behind the lead runner. The Southern women were 9th as a team and sophomore Ashlee Kuykendall placed tenth individually. The Lions are at the University of Arkansas this Saturday to participate in the Chili Pepper Invite.
- **d.** <u>Volleyball –</u> The Southern volleyball team got its first win of the season on Tuesday at Southwest Baptist in a 3-1 win over the Bearcats. Sophomore Janelle Brehm leads the MIAA and is 25th nationally in attacks per set. The Lions host Northwest Missouri on Friday at 6 pm and Missouri Western on Saturday at noon.
- e. <u>Golf –</u> The Lions golf team recently competed in the first MIAA points event of the season at Northeastern State this past Monday and Tuesday. Southern finished tenth as a team, but sixth in the MIAA standings. Individually, Tristan Haltom was tenth overall with a three-under par final score. Southern will host its annual fall golf tournament on Monday and Tuesday of next week at Shangri-La Country Club in Monkey Island, Okla.
- 2. Community Service Routinely, the student-athletes at MSSU average more than ten hours per student per year as that is our goal. Recently the MSSU women's basketball and track and field teams both helped out at the Ronald McDonald House Big Red Shoe Run, Softball volunteered at the Joplin Humane Society by walking and washing dogs, baseball is assisting with the delivery for Meals on Wheels every Wednesday, and men's basketball made a visit to West Central Elementary and read to elementary students.

3. MIAA News:

- **a.** Webcasting Taskforce –We have finalizing the agreed upon standards guide and the CEO's have approved
- **b.** Football Taskforce -The Commissioner had created a taskforce to analyze our current Football schedule. The chair of the committee was President Scott of PSU. The Taskforce submitted its proposals to the

AAC, IRC and it was approved by the CEO Council. With a wide variety of scenarios on membership all but one schedule will include non-conference games.

- c. Membership Taskforce In a similar fashion, the Commissioner had also created a taskforce to analyze our current MIAA membership and membership requirements. The Chair of this committee was President Ambrose of UCM, who recently resigned from his CEO position there. The Taskforce submitted its proposals to the AAC, IRC and it was approved by the CEO Council. The major change would include the potential for allowing institutions into the conference that do not play football. The commissioner will examine institutions of that demographic.

4. NCAA News:

a. NCAA Reporting: We are collaborating with Student Affairs and the ACTS office to bring a high energy interactive production called ThinkFast to our campus. This type of program meets the directives from the NCAA Board of Governor's regarding Title IX Training and Sexual Violence training. The ThinkFast production crew will be on campus September 24th at 7:00 pm. The event will be available to every student on campus but it is mandatory for all student-athletes to attend

5. Departmental News:

a. NCAA Compliance:

- i. Compliance rules presentations given to all athletes at beginning of fall semester athlete orientation meetings
- ii. Code of Conduct rules presented at mandatory all athlete back to school meeting
- **iii.** In process of completing all sports team eligibility lists that must be submitted to MIAA prior to first date of competition
- iv. Submitted NLI Institutional Commitment Form to MIAA
- v. Confirmed certification of compliance for all athletic staff members
- vi. Submitted NCAA Sports Sponsorship and Demographic Report (Due August 1st)
- vii. Working on EADA to be submitted in October
- viii. Verifying full-time enrollment status of all athletes & monitoring daily
- ix. Working with Partners in Prevention Coalition to bring ThinkFast interactive challenge to all athletes on Sept. 24th at 7pm. This will meet the NCAA Title IX requirements for athletes.
- x. BKD will be on campus this fall to complete the institution's agreed-upon procedures report. The report's primary purpose is to ensure that the president is made aware of all financial activity (both internal and external) for athletics purposes and to assist the institution in exercising control over financial activity made by or on behalf of the intercollegiate athletics program. This report is completed every 3 years.

b. Departmental Positional Searches:

i. Head Football Coaching position will remain open until the end of the Football season. In the interim Joe Bettasso, a MSSU Alum and Joplin native, will lead the team. Joe, a MSSU Football Alum, arrived at MSSU with many years of coaching experience in the NCAA. His latest coaching experience in as the defensive coordinator at McKendree University, a member of the GLVC in

- Division 2 where they excelled in defense including having the GLVC Defensive Player of the Year.
- ii. The Head Softball position is currently filled in the interim by Hallie Blackney. Hallie was hired the week before the start of the school year as an assistant coach. The abrupt departure of our previous Head Coach to her alum mater of North Dakota State University left us with Coach Blackney who is highly qualified to fill the role until the new hiring process is completed. Currently the committee is in the phone interview stage of a National Search.
- iii. The Asst. Volleyball Position was filled by Abolanle Onipede. She comes from two years of playing at the University of Alabama. Prior to that she played two season at Blinn College under current Head Coach Kalie Mader. She was the conference Player of the Week four times and was a first-team All-Conference and All-Region pick, while earning honors on the NJCAA All-Tournament team.
- iv. Athletic Sales and Corporate Relations hiring search is underway. We are very excited about the candidate pool and the search committee includes members from University Marketing and the Development office.
- v. Head Strength and conditioning coach will remain open until a new FB head coach has been hired. We are very confident in the assistants currently staffing the Weight Room and appreciate their dedication to MSSU to assist during this time while operating short staffed.

c. Marketing:

- i. Continuing to work on the sponsorships for next season as well as a detailed schedule for give-aways and other in game activities.
- ii. Marketing all athletic events through online newsletter's and social media.
- iii. Developing new social media marketing campaigns.
- iv. Reformatting script for football and creating new in game activities.
- v. Finalizing sponsorship agreements, as well as food and hotel trade agreements.
- vi. In the beginning stages of brainstorming basketball theme nights, events and giveaways.
- vii. Developing new marketing initiatives for MOSO Mane-iacs.

d. SAAC:

i. SAAC currently has 26 members and meets twice a month. The MIAA SAAC initiative is "WECARE" which stands for Wellness, Education, Compassion, Athletics, Respect, and Engagement. In order to meet these initiatives, they are working on their biggest community engagement event, Trick or Treat so Others Can Eat. This event will be held the last week of October. Last year the athletic teams collected and distributed over 6000 nonperishable items to a local food pantry. The current 2018-2019 officers are President: Rachel Ray (Women's Track and Field), Vice-President: Angel Badalamenti (Softball), Secretary: Luz Galindo (Soccer), Pride Promoter: Riley Ingram (Cheer), Alternate: Jake Becker (Men's Golf).

e. Facility Updates:

- i. Replaced batters box and pitchers mound at Warren Turner Baseball Field.
- ii. Videoboard completed in the week prior to the first home football game. It has impacted many events including ones hosted in the North End Zone Facility and Southern Stampede.

- **iii.** Training Room in Leggett & Platt will be completed this week. Trainers expected to start moving in over the weekend.
- iv. Weight Room Renovation in Leggett & Platt will begin this semester.
- v. LED lighting installation in Leggett & Platt expected to begin next month.
- vi. Renovation of Shot Put throwing area underway, project should be completed within the next month.

Report of the Executive Vice President to the MSSU Board of Governors

Fundraising

- Total Giving In FY 2018, total giving was \$3.3 million an increase of more than \$500,000 (+20%) over the previous fiscal year. If the \$1 million Humphreys Scholars gift in FY 2017 were factored out, the growth in FY18 base giving was more than 55%.
- **Donors** The number of donors who made gifts grew as well 1,885 individuals, corporations, and foundations made gifts, <u>an increase of nearly 400 donors (+26%)</u>.



- Alumni Giving Previous efforts to populate the database with all graduates and launch a more aggressive annual giving campaign have had a clear impact. The number of alumni making gifts increased 62% over the previous year (350 new alumni donors).
- Major Gifts Since the last Board of Governors meeting in June, the following major gifts (\$25,000+) have been received:
 - o \$50,000 for the University's new Healthcare Leadership degree program;
 - o \$50,000 pledge payment for the renovation of science labs in Reynolds Hall;
 - o \$50,000 gift for the new Corley Endowed Professorship in Marketing;
 - o \$35,000 pledge payment on the simulation lab mannequins in health sciences;
 - \$32,000 for several endowed student scholarships;
 - o \$25,000 gift for the future renovation of Fred G. Hughes Football Stadium.

Admissions

■ Fall 2018 Enrollment – On census day, Friday, September 14, MSSU recorded 6,006 students compared to 6,174 the previous fall – a decrease of 168 students (-2.7%). Total enrolled hours were recorded at 69,771 credit hours compared to 72,234 last year – a decrease of 2,436 (-3.4%).

Both of these numbers are <u>below the 5% decrease that was budgeted</u> in anticipation of the above-CPI tuition increase, smaller than normal high school graduating classes in the region, and a strong economy with low unemployment.



- Freshmen Students This fall, MSSU welcomed one of its largest freshman classes in history 908 freshmen, down 104 students from 1,012 last year (-10%). This class was notable because of the higher-than-normal yield rate from admitted to enrolled. Of the 2,203 freshmen who were admitted, 908 enrolled a yield rate of 41%. This rate is typically in the 35-38% range.
- Transfer Students On census day, <u>516 transfer students were enrolled</u> at Missouri Southern, a decrease of 58 students compared to last fall (-11%). Again the conversion rate from admitted to enrolled students grew from last year. Of the 831 transfer students who were admitted, the 516 who enrolled represent a 10% growth in the transfer yield rate.
- International Students The number of international students attending Missouri Southern held steady this fall at 213 compared to 214 last year. This includes a student from Hradec Kralove in the Czech Republic, MSSU's newest international partner.
- Dean of Admissions In mid-August, Missouri Southern welcomed a new dean of admissions. Michael Sanders comes to MSSU from the University of Idaho where he served as the director of recruitment, supervising a staff of fifteen student recruiters. Michael was recently named the chair-elect of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, representing more than 2,600 universities in 40 countries. Michael replaces Derek Skaggs who retired as dean of admissions after serving in that role for 22 years.



Chicago Recruiter – The University recently approved the hiring of a new recruiter to cover the Chicago metropolitan market full-time. Previously that market had been covered by an MSSU recruiter out of St. Louis. The Chicago metropolitan area (eight counties) has on average 87,466 high school graduates each year (67% of all Illinois high school grads). By comparison, Jasper, Newton, McDonald, and Dade Counties in Missouri have 25,048 high school graduates on average each year. MSSU enjoys a price advantage over Illinois' public universities. In 2018, MSSU's in-state tuition was less than half of the average public university in Illinois.

University Relations and Marketing

Director of News Services and Messaging – Missouri Southern recently welcomed Mike Olmstead to the URM team. Mike anchored the local Fox 14 evening newscast for many years and has over 25 years of experience in television. As the director of news services and messaging, Mike will be responsible for telling the MSSU story of our accomplished faculty, students, and alumni.



We Are Lions – The University's <u>new marketing campaign</u> recently debuted. Centered on the theme "We are Lions," the campaign is on television, radio, digital advertising, billboards, and social media.

Admissions Materials – URM has been working closely with the Office of Admissions to redesign the collateral material used to recruit students such as the viewbook, transfer guide, international guide, new student guide, and "Lion Lowdown" sheets on over 100 academic departments and programs. In addition, a redesign of the Admission website and recruiting pages currently is underway.



Social Media Ambassadors – URM has identified a number of influential students to serve as thought leaders on social media. These students will jump in to social media conversation threads and serve as advocates for the university. In addition, they will work to promote the university's accomplishments on social media and promote school spirit. The university's social media accounts have grown significantly since 2012.

Alumni Relations

Recent Alumni Events – The Flying Tee Golf Range hosted a Tulsa-area alumni event on Wednesday, July 25th. More than twenty alumni were in attendance. The annual "Day at the K" was held for Kansas City alumni on August 10, as the Kansas City Royals hosted the St. Louis Cardinals. More than 150 alumni were on hand for that event.



Missouri Southern Foundation

- Scholarships Distributed During Fiscal Year 2018, the Missouri Southern Foundation transferred nearly \$1 million in scholarship dollars to the University (\$981,231 an increase of 18% over the previous fiscal year).
- Gift Fee Revenue In 2015, the Foundation established a 5% fee on all expendable gifts to fund additional fundraising, communication, and alumni engagement. In FY 2018, the gift fee generated \$87,569 nearly double what was received in the previous year. No complaints have been received from donors since the fee was established three years ago.
- Alumni / Donor Database Work continues on adding details to the Raiser's Edge constituent database. Recently 4,865 new address (11% of the total database) were discovered through a search of a national address clearinghouse. The process of linking constituents with their scholarships continues, making it easier to send endowment reports, invitations, and other communication to scholarship donors. Finally, 9,700 alumni who received a Foundation scholarship in the last decade (2008-2018) have been coded as such in Raiser's Edge. Records of scholarship recipients prior to 2008 are not readily available.

Video Board – The Missouri Southern Foundation led the financing and procurement of the new video board in Fred G. Hughes Stadium. The board was purchased by the Foundation from Nevco Sports at a total cost of \$1.4 million and will be repaid by MSSU Intercollegiate Athletics through sponsorships over the next ten years.




Governmental and Community Relations

Concurrent Enrollment | Over the past six years, participation in the Concurrent Enrollment program has more than doubled. In Fall 2013, there were 289 participants. This fall, we enrolled 607 students (110.03% increase). The number of credit hours these students enrolled in has kept pace, also doubling. Fall 2018 students are taking a record 2,708 credit hours (110.25% increase). Fall 2018 has represented the largest single semester growth in the past six years. Headcount has increased 128 students (33.68%). Students from 28 schools and home schools are participating in MSSU Concurrent Enrollment this year. Students are engaging in Concurrent Enrollment opportunities in a wider variety of ways. Carthage High School added an additional class this year and is offering both BIO 101 and BIO 121. Lamar High School became a partner school and began offering ENG 101/102 and MATH 130 Dual Credit classes. Schools from beyond our geographic area reached out wanting to partner with us and take advantage of our program. We have begun working with Madison C-3 High School (Moberly area), Clopton and Silex High Schools (Pike County), Calhoun (Henry County), Mark Twain, Perryville, and Festus.

State Technology Student Association Conference 2019

TSA is a national, non-profit organization of middle and high school student members who are engaged in STEM. Since TSA was chartered in 1978, almost 4,000,000 members have participated through competitions, intracurricular activities,



leadership opportunities, and community service. TSA's mission enhances personal development, leadership, and career opportunities in STEM, whereby members apply and integrate these concepts through intracurricular activities, competitions, and related programs. The state conference event is routinely hosted at MO S&T, but MSSU's Engineering Technology was asked to sponsor it in 2019. We have sponsored the TSA regional conference since 2013 and Robert Stokes who is behind the organization of the regional conference is on the state TSA board. The state conference event is

estimated to bring 700-800 middle school/high school/teachers/parents to campus from April 14 through April 16.

TRIO Programs Receive Increase


The MSSU Trio Programs have been notified that they will receive a 4.25% increase in their budgets for the 2018-2019 year. MSSU has the following TRIO Programs:

First-Year Student Convocation

Approximately 250 students and 500 family members enjoyed the First-Year Student Convocation and medallion ceremony. The Convocation welcomes new students into the MSSU family, and each student is presented with a Lion Medallion that features the Alma Mater. Students are then gathered for the traditional Freshmen class photo. In addition, with the assistance and support of the faculty and staff, the First-Year Office registered 829 new students

during Southern Welcome and presented to more than 1,172 parents and family members.

Board Report 09-20-18

<u>State Budget</u> – Since our meeting in June, Governor Parson signed HB3 which keeps next year's state appropriation level with this year. But, he did withhold \$1 million of the \$2 million in one-time funding included by Senator Brown, and the \$1.2 million for the Dental School partnership with UMKC has been removed. You will recall that our original agreement with UMKC included \$3 million for Missouri Southern and \$1.5 million for UMKC, but over the past two years the appropriations were vetoed. This year the appropriation was reduced to such small amounts that we met with our partners at the University of Missouri system and jointly decided to abandon the project.

Missouri Department of Higher Education (MDHE) – As you know, our decision to raise tuition beyond the 2.1% CPI limitation triggered a \$1.165 million dollar penalty and required the submission of a waiver request to MDHE. That led to a series of negotiations that resulted in an agreement that we "book" the entire tuition increase, but only charge 2/3 of the total this year and all of it next year. In exchange for this gesture of good will the penalty was eliminated.

Coordinating Board for Higher Education (CBHE) – Dr. Hodson covered the Sept. 12 CBHE meeting for me as I had planned to be in St. Louis that day, but instead found myself returning to Joplin to welcome our first grandchild into the world (which was a fantastic experience). But, at the meeting former State Senator Gary Nodler was seated as the new CBHE member from southwest Missouri. As I understand it, he will serve on the Budget Committee due to his many years of experience in the Missouri House and Senate. Plus, he has detailed knowledge of the "letter and intent" of the law as it relates to SB389 because he wrote it. So, his understanding of matters in this area will be welcomed by all the universities of the state.

Additionally, the CBHE adopted the MDHE budget recommendations for the 2020 budget. They include increased funding for scholarships, college & university core funding at 2019 levels plus 4% with 3% based on performance funding measures and 1% for equity adjustments, and a new Workforce Development request for \$55.8 million. Accordingly, we are developing a Workforce Development submission for the Department to consider at this very time. Clearly, this request is in line with the priorities spelled out by Governor Parson, so it is likely that some or all of this request will be funded, driving our desire to have our submission in the mix.

<u>University Budget & Great Game of Education (GGOE)</u> – It's hard to overstate the positive impact the Great Game has had on the efficiencies being implemented daily at Missouri Southern. It's clear that the majority of employees now firmly grasp the connection between revenue and expenses and how that impacts the bottom line of the

university, their salaries, professional development budgets, and all other operational requirements.

The requested salary adjustments and Lion's Share distributions simply were not possible or even hoped for just a few short years ago as we struggled to keep the doors open and the light bills paid. So, I would like to thank not only the GGOE Culture Committee and all MSSU employees for their great efforts, but also the Board of Governors for supporting this endeavor and offering encouragement along the way.

Strategic Planning – I would also like to thank the Board for their leadership in developing the new Mission, Vision, and Values statements and the five overarching university goals. While the effort started with several face-to-face and online Stakeholder Engagement sessions involving faculty, staff, students, and patrons... ultimately, the job of consolidating and integrating all of the input rested with the Board of Governors. It required several extra planning meetings that each of you not only attended but became fully engaged. This laborious but valuable work brought us the single page document attached to the back of this report. In a very parsimonious way, it clearly states why the university exists, the values we stand for, and our vision of what we can become. Additionally, in alignment with the statewide Blueprint for Higher Education, you identified five campus-wide strategic goals to serve as the framework through which each department and operational unit can develop cascading plans.

The next step in the process, which is already underway, is to have faculty and staff help develop "SMART" goals that will support the five overarching Board objectives. *SMART goals must be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time bound.* This will necessarily require the identification of appropriate metrics for measurement and regular reporting. Currently, we are working with the Faculty Senate, Staff Senate, and the GGOE Culture Committee to identify three sub-goals to support the five Board stated goals. After the sub-goals are identified and adopted we can then further develop operational initiatives aimed at realization and accomplishment of these goals within the strategy's five year timeline.
