Report by Jared Bruggeman Athletics to Board of Governors Thursday, June 14, 2018

MSSU Athletics Report

1. Sport Program Reports

- **a.** MIAA Hall of Fame Former Lion football player Richard Jordan was inducted into the MIAA Hall of Fame in early June at the MIAA's end of the year Awards Ceremony in Kansas City.
- b. Track and Field The Missouri Southern men's and women's track and field teams completed a very successful season recently. The Southern women finished 11th as a team at the 2018 NCAA Division II Outdoor Track and Field Championships, tying the highest finish for the women in the history of the program. The men finished 17th overall. Bryan Burns won a National Championship in the discus, while also picking up All-America honors in the shot put. Allie Heckemeyer was an All-America in the heptathlon and the triple jump, while Emily Presley was All-America in the pole vault, finishing second.
- c. NCAA Program of the Year Standings The Missouri Southern men's track and field and cross country program finished seventh in the United States Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association Program of the Year standings. This is fourth time in the last five years the men have been the top program in the MIAA (the other time, no team finished in the top ten) standings.
- **d. Baseball** The Missouri Southern baseball team finished 27-23 on the season and had nine players named to the All-MIAA team with Johnny Balsamo earning a spot on the Gold Glove Team. The Lions finished second in the MIAA this year in ERA.
- e. Softball The Missouri Southern softball team had some post-season recognitions as senior outfielder Abi Corbett was named a first-team Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Corbett led the MIAA in hits for the second-straight year and ranked fourth nationally. Corbett also became the MSSU all-time leader in hits (270) and stolen bases with 107. Her 35 stolen bases this year are tied for the second-most in a single-season at MSSU. She graduated from Southern with a 4.00 GPA in marketing and management

- a. Webcasting Taskforce They are finalizing the agreed upon standards guide
- b. Football Taskforce -The Commissioner has created a taskforce to analyze our current Football schedule. The chair of the committee is President Scott of PSU. The Taskforce submitted its proposals to the AAC, IRC and it was approved by the CEO Council earlier this week. With a wide variety of scenarios on membership all but one schedule will include non-conference games.

- c. Membership Taskforce In a similar fashion, the Commissioner has also created a taskforce to analyze our current MIAA membership and membership requirements. The Chair of this committee is President Ambrose of UCM. The Taskforce submitted its proposals to the AAC, IRC and it was approved by the CEO Council earlier this week. The major change would include the potential for allowing institutions into the conference that do not play football.

- **d. MIAA Hall of Fame induction** took place on June 4, 2018 at the Plaza Public Library Auditorium. Richard Jordan, a MSSU alum was part of the class to be inducted. Following the induction we held a social at a nearby location to celebrate with alums and his family. It was a great success.
- e. Ken B. Jones Winner Missouri Southern senior track and field student-athlete Allie Heckemeyer was named the MIAA's Ken B. Jones Award winner in early June. The award is given annually to the top male and female student-athlete in the MIAA and Heckemeyer becomes the third Lion to earn the award since the Lions joined the league in 1989.
- **f.** Academic Excellence The Academic Excellence Awards goes to students that maintain a cumulative 4.0 GPA or better and the student-athletes must also have at least two terms of attendance.
 - i. Earning the award for the spring semester were: Ryan Drendel (men's track and field), Angel Badalementi (softball), Abi Corbett (softball), Taurean Guzman (softball), Allie Heckemeyer (women's track and field), Kristen Koch (women's track and field), Rachel Ray (women's track and field) and Katie Skelton (women's track and field).
- g. Scholar Athlete Award Winners- The league also announced its scholar-athlete award which goes to student-athletes that maintain a cumulative 3.5 GPA or better, while also achieing All-MIAA status in their respective sport. Student-athletes also have to have at least two terms of attendance at the school to earn the award.
 - i. Earning this honor for the Lions were: Alec Alvarez (baseball), Corbin Osburn (baseball), Matt Willis (men's track and field), Corbett, Erika Lutgen (softball), Heckemeyer and Tristan Haltom (men's golf).
- h. MIAA Conference Meetings The meetings were held in Kansas City over two days last week were the FARC, AAC, Officiating and IRC all meet. Day two of the meetings were held in the Kauffmann foundation convention center at no charge for Higher Education. The meetings were very inclusive and had great dialogue regarding the MIAA. SBU has formally agreed to leave the MIAA to become a member of the GLVC in two years.

Admissions

- Fall 2018 Enrollment The impact of the recent tuition increase on Fall 2018 enrollment has occurred as expected. However, as a date-to-date comparison, some of the decrease can be attributed to the timing of Southern Welcome orientation sessions. Last year at this time, we'd had two orientation sessions whereas this year we've had but one of the six scheduled. Each Southern Welcome session has 125 prospective students. In addition, applications from Kansas City, St. Louis, and Springfield are down this year, but have been at record levels over the past three years. Transfer enrollment continues to be a challenge.
- Outreach Efforts During the spring 2018 semester, staff in Admissions made 714 visits to high schools and community colleges and attended 110 college fairs. In addition, the staff hosted 1,155 students and parents through Discovery Days, Saturday Tours and weekday tour programs.
- World Music and Cuisine Festival - Several hundred students, faculty, staff, and community members jammed the Conner Ballroom in mid-April for the annual World Music and Cuisine Festival. Savory and sweet dishes from around the globe were prepared by 39 students, three faculty, eleven community members, five community groups, and six restaurants.

- Northwest Arkansas Alumni Event More than 70 alumni and friends in Northwest Arkansas attended an Arkansas Naturals game on June 7. They enjoyed a pre-game buffet and a fun-filled night at the ballpark.
- Golden Graduates For the second year, graduates of more than fifty years were honored at spring Commencement. Nineteen Joplin Junior College alumni attended a breakfast at the Ralph Gray Alumni Center and then donned cap and gown to lead the student procession in to the first commencement ceremony, occupying the front two rows.
- Alumni Engagement Survey Over 15,000 MSSU graduates with a valid email address received an online survey in June asking them to rate their Southern experience and level of engagement with their alma mater. To date, the response has been encouraging. For example, 71% of respondents rated the extent to which their MSSU degree prepared them for employment as a 4 (well) or 5 (very well). The results will be used for marketing purposes and to direct future alumni engagement efforts.

Eleven students completed the Southern Leadership Academy for Spring 2018. Demographics for the class include: students from nine different majors; five different countries, and of the



U.S. students - seven different cities.

Mental Health Task Force

The Task Force on Mental Health Issues in Higher Education was convened to (1) establish a common understanding of the state of mental health issues in higher education, and (2) to identify reliable and creative strategies that can be pursued by universities, state agencies, and lawmakers to make Missouri a leader in addressing a nationwide issue. Faustina Abrahams, Director of Advising, Counseling and Testing, and Darren Fullerton, VPSA, served on this task force. Some of the key findings include:

- 58% of Missouri college students report having experienced at least one mental health issue in the past year.
- Demand for campus counseling services has increased year after year both in Missouri and nationwide, but resources provided to counseling centers have not kept up.
- Community resources are equally understaffed.
- Mental health issues are the second most common reason students leave a university.

Spencer-Bartlett Respect Award

This year MSSU had eight recipients for the Spencer-Bartlett Respect Award. This award is a monetary award given in memory of Anne and Charles Bartlett and Vera and Spencer Bartlett. The total dollar amount awarded for this year was \$8,200. The 1st place female recipient was Sierra Wells. Sierra is a Health Promotions and Wellness major from Joplin. The 1st place male recipient is Forrest Bunter. Forrest is a Music major from Neosho.

Missouri Council on Student Affairs Legal Update

The VPSA participated in a legal update presented by the legal firm of Husch Blackwell. This update was presented to the Missouri Council on Student Affairs. Topics included: Admissions Requirements,

Free Speech/Expression, Liability Issues for Student Organizations, Title IX Updates, Students at Risk of Violence, and Data Security.

Report of the Faculty Liaison to the Board of Governors

Grant H. Lathrom, Faculty Senate President 2018-2019 June 11, 2018

Opening Statements

I would like to thank the Board for the privilege of being here today. In addition, I would like to thank Dr. Nicoletti and the previous Faculty Senate Executive Committee for their hard work this past year.

Report

The Faculty Senate met on Monday, May 7, 2018 at 3:00 PM. The following is a summary of that meeting

Old Business

There was no old business at this meeting.

New Business - Mid-Term Grade Policy

The Faculty Senate Executive Committee requested the Office of the VPAA to review the Mid-term Grade Policy. The review produced a recommendation for submission of mid-term grades earlier than week 8. The consensus was that this recommendation would make it more difficult for faculty members, due to the fact that there would give insufficient time to have enough content evaluations (tests, quizzes, papers, etc.) to provide any kind of meaningful grade. It was noted that mid-term grades do provide the opportunity to identify struggling students while something may still be done. This is of particular importance for student athletes who must also manage eligibility requirements. The recommendation was rejected.

New Business - Internship Toolkit

The Internship Toolkit is a document which details information for faculty in running an internship, for students in participating in an internship and for perspective employers for utilizing Missouri Southern students as interns. The document provides guidelines which keep the University in compliance with state and federal law regarding employment, as well as guidelines which help ensure that internships maintain an academic focus. The Toolkit was unanimously supported by Faculty Senate.

New Business - Intellectual Property Policy

The faculty senate was asked to discuss the University's intellectual property policy. Voices from a wide variety of academic disciplines expressed concerns regarding the policy. Some of those included lack of a financial assistance component by the University for a faculty member applying for patent or copyright. Other concerns were about ownership of the intellectual property even if created without the use of University resources. At the heart of the concerns was that the policy was so broad and so far reaching that it may actually serve to stifle intellectual work by conveying broad rights on the part of the University with little recourse for faculty. The policy was rejected.

New Business - New Faculty Senate Executive Committee

The new Faculty Senate Executive Committee is: Dr. Grant Lathrom (President), Dr. Rebecca Mouser (President-elect), Dr. Nick Nicoletti (Past-President), Dr. Rich Espinosa (Secretary), Dr. Jim Lile (Parliamentarian), Dr. Rich

Laird (At-Large). This group is made up of faculty members from a wide range of years of experience at Missouri Southern. I believe they will serve the faculty well and I am looking forward to working with them this year.

<u>State Budget</u> – In spite of the various distractions in Jefferson City this spring, the General Assembly diligently continued their work and submitted a balanced budget to the Governor as required by the State Constitution. The budget was not acted on by former Governor Greitens, and Governor Parsons is of course looking it over in detail as part of his compressed transition. So, to this point HB 3 has not been signed.

However, the bill that was sent to the Governor would restore \$68 million to the higher education budget, include a partial appropriation for the dental school partnership with UMKC (60% of necessary funding), and contains a one-time \$2 million appropriation to MSSU to help stabilize our budget by addressing critical maintenance and repair needs. We are very hopeful Governor Parsons signs HB 3 in the near future.

One final comment about the budget process this year... our local delegation, led by Senator Richard were solid as a rock for Missouri Southern. Not only did they advocate for us, they helped change the entire narrative about higher education in the Capitol Building. It was the most positive atmosphere for higher education I've experienced in several years. And, much of the credit for the positive atmosphere goes to the Southwest Missouri delegation. We should let them know how grateful we are for their support every chance we get.

Missouri Department of Higher Education (MDHE) — As you know, our decision to raise tuition beyond the 2.1% CPI limitation required the submission of a waiver request to MDHE. A public comment period is just wrapping up and we will meet with the Commissioner of Higher Education on July 3rd to make our case in person. We understand the Commissioner is concerned about setting a precedent by approving the waiver and relieving MSSU of the financial penalty, but I believe this precedent might be a very good one, simply... "If the lowest cost public university in the State raises tuition by 15% and still remains the lowest cost public university in the State" — then the increase was obviously needed, and the waiver should be approved. Now, and in the future.

In the final analysis the Commissioner will make a decision regarding the waiver request and make a recommendation to the Coordinating Board for Higher Education (CBHE), where the final outcome will be determined. We have no insight regarding when a final determination will be made, but perhaps we will learn more about the timeframe at our July 3rd meeting.

<u>University Budget & Great Game of Education (GGOE)</u> – The university budget just passed a few minutes ago reflects an enormous improvement from where we were last

year and a great deal of the credit for that improvement must go to the Great Game of Education effort and the Culture Committee in particular. Due to their efforts we have witnessed savings all over campus simply by people being more aware of the positive impact even small adjustments can make. But, we have really made progress through the training offered by the GGOE team, the mini games they help develop, and the constant focus on being both "effective and efficient." The Culture Committee will be developing recommendations on a "methodology" to financially reward campus departments and units for improved operations... with an added emphasis on GGOE participation.

My last point about the university budget would be this: If fall enrollment turns out to be steady, the state budget passes without line item vetoes, the waiver request is approved, and we don't perceive an appropriation withholding – we need to take a look at increasing salaries, issuing mid-year stipends, and/or both. The Insurance Committee is already looking at ways to adjust premiums so families can more easily afford our plan, and we also need to look at other ways to reward and compensate our dedicated faculty and staff. These are some of the finest and most talented people I've ever met and as the institutions financial condition improves... so should theirs.

Strategic Planning – We have made great progress on our Strategic Plan development over the past year and now have a very clear and concise Mission Statement, Vision Statement, and list of Values. We have conducted a SWOT Analysis, Environmental Scan, and an Aspirational Thinking exercise. All of this effort now brings us to the last, but perhaps most important step, developing four or five "overarching campus wide goals." These campus wide goals will then lay the framework for departments and units to develop specific goals and forecasts under this umbrella. It will also assist the GGOE effort to forecast, track, assist, and ultimately measure results. So, we need to schedule at least one more planning session fairly soon to discuss the results of our last meeting (SWOT Analysis, etc.) and to set some goals in place.
