REASONS FOR RECOGNITION AND CELEBRATION /

- For the second straight year, students from the Plaster School of Business at Missouri Southern have claimed the title in the NASBITE International Student Case Competition. The five-member team completed a 20-page analysis that involves the Ohio-based Cleveland Whiskey. The small manufacturer is seeking to expand globally, focusing on the Asian market and Singapore in particular. Papers were submitted by teams from 30 universities and then blind reviewed. The top three schools were invited to make a presentation to company representatives during the 29th annual NASBITE International Conference, held April 4-8 in Newport, Rhode Island.
- tudents from Missouri Southern achieved a perfect score and tied for first place during the 21st annual Missouri Collegiate Mathematics Competition, held April 7-8 at Missouri Western State University in St. Joseph. Team members are required to solve complex math problems during the annual competition. The MSSU team tied with a team from Washington University in St. Louis. The score is the first perfect score and the first tie for first place in the 21-year history of the competition. This year also marks the first time MSSU has ever placed among the top three winners at the event.

At the request of the Provost, Distance Learning is reviewing all of MSSU's online courses. To accomplish this, a checklist has been developed. The checklist is designed to establish and verify a baseline of quality and flag areas of concern. The DL checklist does not assess academic content.

The evaluation is being carried out by DL staff with no disruption to ongoing course activities. In future semesters, the procedure will continue, evaluating half of all internet courses each semester, with all courses being evaluated each academic year. As time progresses, expectations identified in the checklist will become well established, and the process more efficient, possibly even superfluous.


The checklist addresses three areas:

- 1. Items that affect Bb storage
- 2. Compliance with existing DL policy
- 3. Observance of a small list of "best practices"

The checklist includes items that are easily checked and fixed, and can have a large and positive impact for students. These include the use of a standard set of navigation buttons, location and inclusion of important documents, information and notices, accurate due dates for assignments, regular and substantive announcements, up-to-date grading, properly functioning links and multimedia, and more.

To date, 57 evaluated courses have averaged 14 of 19 possible points. Areas of strength have included the standard locations of critical documents and information, upto-date grading, and the provision of approved and required weekly activities, very important to Financial Aid when determining last date of attendance. Items most commonly flagged for follow-up include the use of a standard set of navigation links, the association of due dates to grade center columns (critical to the use of the Blackboard Universal Calendar), and well organized student grade centers.

Follow-up is conducted a week after the initial review. At that time, a determination is made as to the need for any further action. In most cases, thanks to prompt attention by faculty, the process is closed and the course is awarded DL's "Pride in Online



Education" quality assurance badge, prominently placed in the banner of the course.

The process is never closed until all list items have been addressed, or a plan for future compliance has been established and agreed upon.

Deans, Chairs, and the Provost, if necessary, are included in all communications related to the checklist review.

DL is excited to be part of this important quality assurance initiative. We are greatly appreciative of the Provost for her support, as well as the support, cooperation and participation of Deans, Department Chairs, and faculty.




